Lenten Disciplines



Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics 14 years and older on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays of Lent.

Fasting is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59. Those who are bound by this may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

By the threefold discipline of fasting, almsgiving and prayer, the Church keeps Lent from Ash Wednesday until the evening of Holy Thursday, which is on April 18.

+Dear Friends,

Traditionally, *PASSION-TIDE* begins with this Fifth Sunday of Lent.

The statues are covered as a visible means of the holy and glorious being withdrawn as our Lord faces the heart of His Passion and ultimate death. On the Fifth Sunday of Lent, St. Augustine contrasts the writing of the Law of Moses with what our Lord writes here on the ground. At Sinai, the Law was written on tablets of stone. Stone is excellent for recording...we still speak of something "set in stone," for example. It speaks of permanence and durability.

Stone, however, also possesses the hint of death; think of headstones in a cemetery, for example. Stone can be used to kill. We see in this reading of the Gospel the intention of the people to stone Jesus. So, Jesus writes on the ground. Unlike stone, earth has the ability to bring forth life and produce good fruit. Stone can identify and make permanent a record of our sins; in a metaphorical sense of the word. Jesus desires to write of Divine Mercy on our hearts, that we might produce good fruit.

Today Jesus gives the adulterous woman a chance to turn away from sin and turn back to God. A remarkable part of the encounter is that she admits her sin; we often do not. We have a tendency to blame others; either personally or societal, for OUR sins. Jesus today offers us the same opportunity He offered the adulterous woman. Shall we take it?

Perhaps your personal Lent hasn't been that great. Has it? Passion-tide is an *excellent* time to "reignite" and prepare for the glory of Easter. Use these last precious weeks of Lent to truly prepare for the Holy Triduum of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil!

On Tuesday, April 16, the priests of the Archdiocese join with Archbishop Thompson at the Cathedral at 2:00 p.m. to celebrate the annual CHRISM MASS. At the Mass, the Holy Oils for next year's usage will be blessed and the priests renew their promises of ordination. It is always a beautiful Mass and I encourage any of you who may wish to attend! Pray for your priests!

May God, Who has begun this good work in us, bring it to completion!

General Interest

If you are not able to attend the communal Stations of the Cross devotional prayer on Friday evenings, you can pray the Stations in the RE building between the Sunday Masses. The building will be open with stations and prayers posted on the walls of the hallway.

Putting our faith into action with **Catholic Relief Services - Rohingya Refugee Crisis**: Some 628,000 Rohingya people are living in Bangladesh in the largest and most dense refugee camp in the world. There has been much debate about whether they will be forcibly returned to Myanmar, from which they fled genocide. CRS is supporting more than 263,000 Rohingya refugees with shelter and settlement, water and sanitation, protection for children and vulnerable groups, and disaster risk reduction within the camp. Visit crs.org, enter "March/April 2019 Global Emergency Update" in the search box.

This week we encounter Waisa and Kumba in Sierra Leone: Things are changing in Sierra Leone. When Waisa was a girl, no one thought girls should attend school. But now the value of education to all people to their country (after a 10-year civil war) is appreciated. Waisa works a large garden to help send her granddaughter to a CRS-sponsored school. The school includes a nutritious lunch so students can concentrate on their studies instead of their hunger. Kumba wants to study to become a nurse, so that people in her community won't have to travel long distances to receive health care when they become ill.
